## Jammin' On Main

7:15 tonight and 6 p.m. Saturday in downtown Cincinnati. \$8 (single night admission), \$10 (both nights).

Lexington's Funnel gets to open the Saturday evening entertainment at Cincinnati's weekendlong spring blowout, Jammin' On Main. The music will be spread out over three stages that are, unfortunately, only identified by their corporate sponsors. But Jammin' On Main all but consumes downtown Cincinnati. You can't miss it.

The event tops off what has been an enormously busy 16 months of existence for Funnel - vocalist Allen Case, guitarists Matt Weisenberger and Kevin Rexroat, bassist Phil Weisenberger (Matt's brother) and drummer Jamie Eades. A month after its formation, the band won the 1998 installment of WKQQ-101.1 FM's Decent Exposure contest. Jammin' On Main represents Funnel's largest out-oftown show to date.

"This will probably be our biggest show ever," said Matt Weisenberger. "We've got that coming up, plus we've been trying to spend more time writing some new music and honing that down. It's been a lot of fun."

Also at Jammin' on Main, but in a headline capacity tonight, is former Lexingtonian and recent Grammy winner Bela Fleck. The banjo ace will be performing with his electric fusion-and-more band the Flecktones but will be heading back to Lexington to share the stage at the Kentucky on May 19 with mentor Tony

## Junior Brown/Mandy Barnett

Here's a another chance to preview a major act that's heading our way.

Guitarist Junior Brown will be bringing his patented doubleneck "guit-steel" country mischief to the Kentucky Theatre on August 19. Tickets go on sale Saturday at the Kentucky box office.

But for a more immediate peek at what Brown has been up to lately, take a quick road trip to Headliner's in Louisville on Saturday night.

The newest Brown sounds can be found on the year-old Long Walk Back, a hearty sampler of slow-poke Texas country (Long Walk to San Antone), a bizarre island-flavored rockabilly guitar summit (Rock-a-Hula Baby)

and a nine-minute blues exercise that takes Brown out of his familiar retro-country turf (Stupid Blues).

And in strictly non-musical news, X-Files fanatics may have caught a brief cameo by Brown as an Idaho farmer on a November 1998 episode entitled "Drive."

If you're planning on seeing Brown on Saturday, you should definitely get

there in time for the opening act, Mandy Barnett, whose tough and traditionally-flavored I've Got a Right to Cry is one of the best country albums so far this year. Tickets Mandy are available through Ticket-
